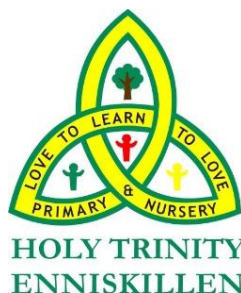

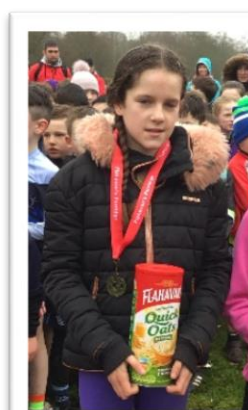

School Matters!



Attendance

Holy Trinity regards excellent attendance in school as vitally important in allowing a child to fulfil their potential. Children need to attend school to learn, to make good friends, to

experience new things in life and to build confidence and self-esteem. Children who regularly miss school without good reason are more likely to become isolated from their friends, to underachieve and/or become involved in anti-social behaviour. A habit formed now of poor attendance can be very difficult to change in adolescence.

In Holy Trinity we encourage children to have excellent attendance by giving monthly class prizes for attendance. We also give out certificates/prizes to individuals with excellent attendance each term. For children who go below **85% attendance** we send out letters and sometimes invite parents in to talk about the issues around attendance. If a child goes below 85% attendance, then a referral to Education Welfare Service is sometimes necessary.

Our class winners for best attendance for first term are Mrs Maguire P3 – 97% and Mrs Mc Menamin P4 – 97% for KS1. Mr Devlin's P6 class was best in KS2 with 97.2%.

The school target this year is 95%. For first term we achieved 94.8% which is quite good but we still need to improve. Children should aim for an attendance of 96% minimum.

Why it is so important children attend school:

- To learn.
- To make new friends.
- To experience new things in life.
- To gain qualifications.
- To develop new skills.
- To build confidence and self-esteem.
- To have the best possible start in life.

Remember: Young people who regularly miss school without good reason are more likely to become isolated from their friends, to underachieve in examination and/or become involved in anti-social behaviour.

Primary 3 overview of planned work - January

Mathematics

Depending on group children will focus on: counting in 1s, 2s, 3s, 5s, 10s/ numbers before, after and between up to 50 or 100; adding a single digit number to a double digit up to 100; adding 3 numbers horizontally and vertically; reading and spelling number names to 20; missing number sums; doubles and near doubles; work on number stories up to 10 or 20 (depending on ability group) consolidating addition and subtraction tables; recognise what is the ten and unit of a given number and add T. U. without bridging the 10.

Topic Work

Name and identify the properties of 2D and 3D shapes; Recognise the symmetry in shapes

Literacy

We will begin to look at stories by the author **Jill Tomlinson** and work on her novel ***The Owl Who Was Afraid Of The Dark***. Associated work will include character profiles, book reviews, comprehensions and narrative writing. Connected to our Winter theme children will look at poems, complete their own acrostic poetry and creative writing. Grammar focus will be on punctuation of sentences, adjectives and adding **ing** to a word. Big book focus will look at positional language.

The World Around Us: Our main theme is Winter, children will investigate penguins and their habitat. They will devise ways of measuring and recording weather and make their own weather symbols. They will investigate permanent and non-permanent changes which occur when looking at icecubes. Pupils will be able to make simple plans of their classroom using a key.

Primary 4 overview of planned work - January

Literacy: Pupils will know that comparative adjectives are used to compare **two** things usually by adding the suffix **er**. Pupils will know that superlative adjectives are used to compare **more than two things** usually by adding the suffix **est**. Pupils will continue to learn their spellings using the LSCWC method and will complete various activities to reinforce the spelling rule. Pupils will be reading their class novel, 'Flat Stanley and the Great Egyptian Grave Robbery' and will be carrying out activities based on this. In writing pupils will be learning about instructions and will be writing instructions for mummification linked to their WAU topic.

Numeracy: Pupils will be learning about multiplication. They will know that multiplication is repeated addition and that it can be done in any order. They will continue to learn multiplication facts. Pupils will solve simple multiplication word problems and learn how to multiply a 2-digit number by a single digit. Our topic work this month will cover handling data where pupils will use tally charts, record information on bar graphs and interpret and read pictograms.

World Around Us: Our topic this term will be Ancient Egypt. Pupils will be able to locate Egypt on a map and will be able to name the 7 continents. Pupils will learn about the features of rivers and learn about the importance of the River Nile. They will look at what has survived in Egypt today and they will learn about mummification. In science, pupils will design a fair test to mummify an apple. In art, pupils will look at self-portraits and complete their own. We will be researching Ancient Egypt to help us complete PowerPoints in ICT.

Primary 5 overview of planned work - January

Numeracy

- **Number:** Multiplication work and problem solving activities
- **Topic:** Compass points and directional work, calendar work linked to New Year and basic time work
- **Mental Maths** – Multiplication tables
- **Home** - Learn times tables that are set each week
- **Problem solving activities and word problems** for multiplication

Literacy

- **Novel:** Starting '**Kaspar Prince of Cats**' novel and related activities from novel booklet

- **Grammar work** – Compound words (combination of two or more **words** that function as a single unit of meaning, homophones (said same but with a different meaning and spelling) and synonyms (similar words)
- **Writing** – Diary Writing: Important features of a diary account, writing in the 1st person, sequencing events in chronological order and including feelings and emotions
- We will complete Schofield & Sims Spelling programme

World Around Us

- Topic work – Finish plants work and start new topic of Titanic
(Who built it, where it was built, construction and departure, sections of the ship and passengers on the Titanic)

Other Information.

- Complete 10 minutes Doodle Maths and AR every night (2 quizzes per week)
- Take away homework fully completed to best of ability
- Diary signed every night
- Highlight important words/symbols in Mental Arithmetic
- Musical Instruments to be brought into school every Wednesday. Could children practise instruments at home and follow the 'Charanga' programme (lessons continued from school)
- Friday 26th February 2019- **Trip to the Titanic Quarter Belfast**

Primary 6 overview of planned work - January

Maths: Number. Pupils will:

- know tables up to x 12
- know how to do short and long multiplication to 10,000.
- solve word problems associated with multiplication.
- understand the relationship between multiplication and division.

Topic: AREA. Pupils will:

- be able to calculate perimeters of a range of shapes
- understand the term Area and be able to work out areas of 2D shapes (regular and irregular) by counting squares/ formula. (cm²)
- know that the area of square/rectangle (**LxB**)
- know area of a triangle is LxB divided by 2

English Pupils will:

- recognise a play and how it is structured
- design a comic strip and begin to write a short play script.
- understand and know the correct punctuation and grammar needed to write a play script.
- know how dialogue is set out and be able to use adverbs to qualify verbs in writing dialogue

World Around Us. Pupils will:

- complete our space topic by visiting the Planetarium.
- begin the Vikings topic and find out who the Vikings were, where they came from and why they travelled to new lands.

Children are encouraged to visit their local library and take out books that may be relevant to our topic.

Homework

We encourage the P6's to keep doing AR reading and Doodle Maths which is part of their daily homework. Each pupil should be taking at least one AR test per week (more if on green and orange level) and working towards their word count target for the term.

Takeaway will continue for P6.

- **AR Books** can be changed in the library between 8.30 and 8.50.
- **ICT suite** is also available at these times to complete AR tests.

Trips: The P6 pupils will be having a trip to the Armagh Planetarium on **Thursday 17th January.**

Primary 7 overview of planned work- January

Numeracy

- this term in number we will be covering place value, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
- topic work will be covering Measures looking at length, weight, conversions and imperial units.
- times tables from 1-12.

Literacy

- In writing children will focus on different types of poetry
- Children will complete grammar work on nouns and revision of punctuation.
- Novel Book – 12th Day of July

World Around Us: The Topic this term is Ireland/Northern Ireland.

PE: Children will be participating in weekly swimming and gymnastics lessons- please remember school PE uniform.

Confirmation

- Confirmation is on **Sunday 19th May in St Michael's Parish Church.**
Note: If your child is making Confirmation you must fill out the Request for Confirmation Form

Homework

- P7 will now begin take away homework tasks.
- On a Monday night children should choose 1 task from their 'menu' to be completed for Friday.
- Children will complete one mental arithmetic test each week and will have the 'At Home' page from Grow in Love to discuss.
- Spellings, Doodle Maths, Accelerated Reading and class reader will continue.

Trips:

- **Friday 3rd May 2019** - Confirmation retreat on Lough Derg
- **Monday 17th- Wednesday 19th June** - End of year trip to Dublin.
