

I would like to take this opportunity to wish you a Happy New Year. I want to remind you of a number of procedures in school which are important to ensure that the children receive the best education we can provide and learn in a safe, secure environment:

- 1. Healthy eating and physical activity:** To help our children lead healthy active lives we would ask parents and staff to make sure:

## Madison raises £700 for Mary's Meals

## Attendance

Congratulations to Mrs Farley's P2 class and Mrs Greene's P5 class for having the highest attendance in first term. The classes got a certificate and extra play time as reward. December monthly awards go to Mr Devlin's P6 class (KS2) and Mrs McMenamain's P4 class (KS1).

Our school target for attendance this year is 96%. This is a high but achievable target and one which the Department of Education would see as appropriate for primary schools. It is very important for your child to be at school as much as possible to help them with their school and class routines, maintain class friendships and to achieve academically.



### HOW PARENTS CAN HELP

- Establish a good routine in the mornings and evenings so your child is prepared for the school day ahead.
- Make sure your child goes to school regularly and follows the school rules.
- Ensure your child arrives at school on time – not late.
- Arrange dental and medical appointments outside school hours when possible.
- Always inform the school if your child is absent due to illness.
- Take truancy seriously, if your child is not attending school as you expect they may be putting themselves at risk. Who are they with? What are they doing?
- Take family holidays outside term time.
- Talk to your child about school and take an interest in their school work (including homework).
- Attend parent evenings and school events.
- Praise and reward your child's achievements at school.
- Always support school staff in their efforts to control difficult or challenging behaviour.
- Discuss any problems or difficulties with the school, staff are there to help and will be supportive.

**Do not be afraid to ask for help if a problem arises.**

## Overviews for January

### Primary 3



**Mathematics:** Depending on group children will focus on:

- counting in 1s, 2s, 3s, 5s, 10s, numbers before, after and between, up to 50 or 100
- adding a single digit number to a double digit up to 100
- adding 3 numbers horizontally and vertically
- read and spell number names to 20
- missing number sums
- doubles and near doubles

Pupils will continue work on number stories up to 10 or 20 (group dependant) consolidating addition and subtraction tables. They will recognise what is the ten and unit of a given number and add T. U. without bridging the 10.

**Topic Work:** Name and identify the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, recognise the symmetry in shapes

**Literacy:** We will begin to look at stories by the author *Jill Tomlinson* and work on her novel *The Owl Who Was Afraid Of The Dark*. Associated work will include character profiles, book reviews, comprehensions and narrative writing.

Connected to our theme 'Winter' children will look at poems completing their own acrostic poetry and creative writing. Grammar focus will be on punctuation of sentences, adjectives and adding **ing** to a word. Big book focus will look at positional language.

**The World Around Us:** Our main theme is Winter. Children will investigate Penguins and their habitat. They will devise ways of measuring and recording weather and make their own weather symbols. They will investigate permanent and non-permanent changes which occur when looking at ice-cubes. Pupils will be able to make simple plans of their classroom using a key.

#### Other Information

- **30<sup>th</sup>/31<sup>st</sup> January** - P3 classes will visit the town library (details to follow)
- PE programme pupils - weekly dance class this term

### Primary 4

**Literacy-** Pupils will know that comparative adjectives are used to compare **two** things usually by adding the suffix er. Pupils will know that superlative adjectives are used to compare **more than two things** usually by adding the suffix est. Pupils will continue to learn their spellings using the LSCWC method and will complete various activities to reinforce the spelling rule. Pupils will be reading their class novel 'Flat Stanley and the Great Egyptian Grave Robbery' and carrying out activities based on this. In writing pupils will be learning about instructions and will be writing instructions for mummification linked to their WAU topic.

**Numeracy-** Pupils will be learning about multiplication. They will know that multiplication is repeated addition and that it can be done in any order. They will continue to learn multiplication facts. Pupils will solve simple multiplication word problems and learn how to multiply a 2-digit number by a single digit. Our topic work this month will cover handling data where pupils will use tally charts, record information on bar graphs and interpret and read pictograms.

**World Around Us-** Our topic this term will be Ancient Egypt. Pupils will be able to locate Egypt on a map and will be able to name the 7 continents. Pupils will learn about the features of rivers and learn about the importance of the River Nile. They will look at what has survived in Egypt today and they will learn about mummification. In science, pupils will design a fair test to mummify an apple. In art, pupils will look at self-portraits and complete their own. We will be researching Ancient Egypt to help us complete PowerPoints in ICT.

### Primary 5

#### Numeracy

- **Number:** Multiplication and division work. Problem solving activities
- **Topic:** Compass points and directional work, calendar work linked to New Year and basic time work
- **Mental Maths** – Multiplication and division tables
- **Home** - Learn times tables that are set each week
- Problem solving activities and word problems for multiplication

#### Literacy

- **Novel:** 'Kaspar Prince of Cats' Novel and related activities from novel booklet
- **Grammar work:** Compound words (combination of two or more words that function as a single unit of meaning, homophones (said same but with a different meaning and spelling) and synonyms (similar words)

- **Writing:** Diary Writing – Important features of a diary account, writing in the 1<sup>st</sup> person, sequencing events in chronological order and including feelings and emotions
- We will complete Schofield & Sims Spelling programme and related activities (week 13, 14, 15)

### **World Around Us**

- Topic work – Finish topic of Enniskillen work and start new topic ‘Titanic’  
Who built it, where it was built, construction and departure, sections of the ship and passengers on the Titanic

### **Other Information**

- Sign diary when checking homework activities – *Week 1 (Literacy), Week 2 (Numeracy), Week 3 (World Around Us), Week 4 (Religion, P.D.M.U).* Spellings/tables/reading and M/A to be completed every night
- 10 minutes Accelerated reading every night- 2 quizzes per week (Children can go to library/computer suite each morning from 8.30am – 8.45am to complete quizzes and borrow/change books. Pupils choose one big book and one smaller one on their level. Quizzes can be completed on library books and on nightly reading book every week
- Bring **instrument** into school every Wednesday (Keep safe at home please) – Use of ‘**Charanga Music Programme**’ at home (Passwords given to all children)
- **Highlight important information or signs in Mental Arithmetic work.** Complete corrections
- Shared Education with Jones Memorial – 14<sup>th</sup> January
- Fire Station talk – 16<sup>th</sup> January
- Football every Monday and Friday for this term
- Trip to the Titanic Quarter Belfast – To be confirmed for Feb/March

## **Primary 6**

### **Maths Number** Pupils will:

- know tables up to X 12
- know how to do short and long multiplication to 10,000.
- solve word problems associated with multiplication.
- understand the relationship between multiplication and division.

### **Topic** Pupils will:

- understand Rotational Symmetry
- be able to calculate perimeters of a range of shapes
- understand the term ‘Area’ and be able to work out areas of 2d shapes (regular and irregular) – counting squares/formula. (cm<sup>2</sup>)
- know that the area of square/rectangle is **(LxB)**
- know area of a triangle is LxB divided by 2

### **English** Pupils will:

- recognise a play and how it is structured
- design a comic strip and begin to write a short play script.
- understand and know the correct punctuation and grammar needed to write a play script.
- know how dialogue is set out and be able to use adverbs to qualify verbs in writing dialogue

### **World Around Us** Pupils will:

- complete our space topic by visiting the Planetarium.
- begin The Vikings topic and find out who the Vikings were, where they came from and why they travelled to new lands?

*Children are encouraged to visit their local library and take out books that may be relevant to our topic.*

### **Homework**

We encourage the P6’s to keep doing AR reading as part of their daily homework. Each pupil should be taking at least one AR test per week (more if on green and orange level).

### **Remember:**

- AR Books can be changed in the library between 8.30 and 8.50.
- ICT suite is also available at these times to complete AR tests.

**Note:** *The P6 pupils will be having a Trip to Armagh Planetarium on January 20<sup>th</sup>*

## Primary 7

**Numeracy** This term in number, we will be covering Place value, addition, subtraction multiplication and division. For topic work we will be covering Measures – looking at length, weight, conversions and imperial units. Times tables from 1-12.

**Literacy** In writing children will focus on different types of poetry. Children will complete grammar work on nouns and revision of punctuation. Novel Book – 12th Day of July

**World Around Us** The Topic this term is Ireland/Northern Ireland.

**PE** Children will be participating in weekly swimming lessons. Girls will have the opportunity to take part in netball lessons.

### Homework

- P7s will now begin 'Takeaway Homework' tasks. On a Monday night they should choose 1 task from a choice of 3 to be completed for Friday.
- They will also complete one Mental Arithmetic test each week and will have the 'At Home' page from Grow in Love to discuss.
- Spellings, Accelerated Reading and class reader will continue.
- **Confirmation:** Confirmation is on Sunday 29th March in St Michael's Parish Church.


### Trips
